Special council election meet se

A special meeting of the Faculty Council for the purpose of electing the seven faculty members on the presidential search and selection advisory committee has been set for 3:15 p.m. Feb. 28 in the Con Con Room of the International Center.

An agenda for the meeting, a memorandum regarding election procedures, a slate of 14 candidates and vitae for the candidates has been sent to council members.

The slate includes Robert Barker, professor, biochemistry; Norma S. Bobbitt, professor, family ecology; Douglas Dunham, professor, social science; Julia S. Falk, associate professor, linguistics and oriental languages; Jeanne

E. Gullahorn, professor, psychology; Gordon E. Guyer, director; Cooperative Extension Service; Walter F. Johnson, professor, administration and higher education;

Lee N. June, assistant professor, Counseling Center; William Lazer, professor, marketing and transportation administration; Margaret F. Lorimer, professor, Institutional Research; Clifford J. Pollard, professor, botany and plant pathology; Lawrence N. Redd, assistant professor, telecommunication; Norman Edward Robinson, associate professor, physiology and large animal surgery and medicine; and William C. Taylor, professor, civil and sanitary engineering.

The council members will select seven of

the 14 candidates to serve on the advisory committee. The University Committee on Academic Governance has determined that the seven persons receiving the highest number of votes will be selected, except that if a non-tenured member is not included in the top seven, the non-tenured member receiving

When the presidential search and selection advisory committee begins its deliberations, it will immediately be faced with about 100 applications and nominations which have been submitted thus far, says Gwendolyn Norrell, chairwoman of the Steering Committee and acting chairwoman of the advisory committee.

"We sent out 53 letters of acknowledgement on Friday (Feb. 17)," Norrell said, "and have another 35 or so in." (This was at the beginning of the week.)

For nominations which have been received, Norrell said, each nominee will have to be contacted to see if he or she wishes to be considered for the presidential position and then to submit the necessary vitae.

highest number of votes will be added to the six persons receiving the highest number of votes for a total of seven.

This provision is in accordance with section 2.6.3.1 of the presidential selection procedure approved by the Board of Trustees which stipulates that at least one of the seven positions must be filled by a non-tenured member of the regular faculty. June and Redd are the non-tenured faculty members on the slate.

The slate was determined by the faculty members of the academic governance committee during a 3½ - hour meeting on Friday. The group screened about 100 nominations for the slate.
