## Presidential advisory committee begins work

In cautious, careful fashion the Search and Selection Committee Advisory to the Board of Trustees on the Appointment of a President began a slow process which will eventually lead to the board's naming of that president.

The advisory committee's opening session on March 15 found members first attending to the practical duties and decisions which precede candidate search and selection. Four subcommittees were named to consider this preliminary business.

Serving on the subcommittee to

His lecture entitled: "Understanding the Valence Excitations of Atomic Nuclei," is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. in 118 Physics Astronomy Building.

Wildenthal, is considered a world authority on the "nuclear shell model" of atomic nuclei and is the author of more than 60 research papers.

Keith Groty, assistant vice president for personnel and employee relations, commented on personnel selection procedures, advising the committee on dos and don'ts of interviewing under present regulations.

He discussed with committee members record keeping, legal implications and reference checks. He advised the committee to be "as clear and objective as possible," to keep proper documentation and to make the president's job description as complete as possible. Basic procedural decisions should be made at the beginning of the interviewing task, Groty said.

The committee will have a temporary home base in 117A Linton Hall with a secretary named for the duration of the committee's duties.

A discussion of the permanent chairperson during the open portion of the meeting focused on whether that person should come from within or without the committee and, if from without, whether that chairperson should have vote.

The committee went into closed session at the end of the meeting to discuss potential candidates for chairperson. This closure was protested by some representatives of the press attending the meeting.

The next meeting is scheduled for 1:15 p.m. today (Thursday) in 443A Administration Building. Committee members hope to appoint a chairperson at that time.
