Candidates to be cut to 10-15

The Presidential search committee will meet tomorrow in private to narrow its list of 35 candidates to 10-15 finalists.

"It can be noted, however, that no candidate — from day one to now — is 'formally' out of the running," says Terry Denbow, director of public relations and the committee's spokesperson. "It's possible that a current candidate not among the 35 could be a finalist. Also, it must be remembered there is no deadline for nominations."

The committee is working toward a Nov. 15 deadline for submitting the names of three candidates to the Board of Trustees.

"It has not yet been decided what role the two trustees-elect will have between Nov. 6 (election day) and the naming of a new president," Denbow says. "Governor Blanchard's board appointee (to replace Bobby Crim, who resigned) will automatically become a member of the search committee the day he or she becomes a trustee."

On Dec. 31, the terms of Trustees Peter Fletcher and Blanche Martin will expire. The Republican Party has nominated Kathy Wilbur, an assistant to State Sen. William A. Sederburg, and Dean M. Pridgeon, former director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, for the two slots. The Democratic Party failed to support Martin in his bid for reelection and instead nominated Charles Vincent, a Detroit physician, and June Kretzschmer of Bayport, owner-manager of Kretzschmer Home Center and bookkeeper for the family-owned farm.

After tomorrow's list-paring, the search committee will begin interviewing candidates.
